* MICROTRANSACTIONS EXPOSED: THE REAL COST OF THAT SKIN

You log in, check the shop, and there it is—that must-have skin. A few taps (and dollars) later, and you've got a fresh new flex for the lobby. These small, in-game purchases, known as microtransactions, may seem harmless at first, but without a plan, they can add up fast. One minute you're customizing your character, the next you're wondering where all your money went.

THE REAL PRICE OF YOUR FAVORITE GAME GEAR

A \$10 battle pass every season = \$40/year. A new \$5 skin every two weeks = \$130/year. A \$3 emote every month = \$36/year. A \$7 pet every other month = \$42/year.

That adds up to nearly **\$250** a year. What would you rather spend that money on?

GAR UP LIKE A PRO

- Turn off "save payment info" options so you have to pause & think before buying
- Use gift cards instead of linking your debit or credit card
- Watch out for sales and bundles that seem like a good deal but add up quickly

HOW GAMES MAKE THOSE LITTLE PURCHASES FEEL LIKE NO BIG DEAL:

- The game's free, but the extras aren't: You didn't pay to play, so spending a few bucks here and there doesn't feel like much.
- Prices are low, so spending feels small: \$1.99 for a skin or \$4.99 for a battle pass seems harmless until you've bought five of them.
- In-game currency makes it easy to forget it's real money: Spending 800 V-Bucks doesn't hit the same as spending \$8, even though that's what it is.
- Limited-time offers create FOMO: "Only 24 hours left!" or "This deal won't be back!" makes you feel like you have to buy it now.
- Cool skins and upgrades are everywhere—and everyone else has them: When your whole squad is wearing matching gear, it's hard not to want in.

Global microtransactions are expected to reach at least \$86.51 billion in 2025. That's over \$236 million spent every single day enough to buy nearly half a million PS5s every 24 hours.
